Financial Presentation to the Congregation

On 23rd October 2011 Mr Kenneth Murray gave the following report to the Congregation on our financial position.

"Ladies and Gentlemen,
I have been asked by the Finance Committee of the Kirk Session to offer you, the members of St. Mary's, a simple explanation of our finances. Our financial structure is complicated but I want to concentrate on three aspects:-

1) Our Assets

"As a congregation we are extremely fortunate that our forefathers accumulated substantial assets over many years. This, our 'family silver', has become the foundation upon which our finances today are built. We have a portfolio of stocks and shares which is professionally managed on our behalf. You will, I am sure, be aware that financial markets across the world have experienced considerable turmoil, particularly over the last few months. Whilst we are not in any way complacent, this really becomes an issue for us only when we need to sell any of the holdings in our portfolio. The key principle is that we would want to avoid being a forced seller and rather that we plan carefully for any eventuality that requires us to realise cash proceeds. Our portfolio of securities was worth just over £1 million as at 30 September.

2) Our Income

"Our income comes primarily from two sources, firstly from our assets. We have asked our investment manager to ensure that the income stream from our portfolio is at least maintained and indeed enhanced where opportunities arise. In 2011, we expect to receive around £38K, a higher yield than the average from the Stock Market. In other words, our assets are working hard to generate income for us. Of this £38K, the use to which we can put £14K is restricted under the legal terms covering the gifting of the underlying assets, £5K is used to cover fabric costs, leaving £19K to use against our expenses.

"Our second source of income is from you, the members. This includes weekly offerings and other donations and, very importantly, the tax that St. Mary's can reclaim from the Government on gift aided freewill offerings. In total, we expect this to amount to £63K in 2011. This gives us a total unrestricted income of £82K.

3) Our Expenditure

"By far the largest single item of expenditure is our Ministry and Mission allocation, our contribution to the wider work of the Church. This is calculated by 121 George Street and in 2011, amounts to nearly £58K. Our other costs, including heat and light, insurance etc are budgeted to cost £43K. As many of you will be aware, the Kirk Session has pared this expenditure back, eliminating costs that are deemed not to be essential and there is little more that can be done in this regard. So in total, our expenditure is in the region of £101K.

"Taking our income of £82K into account, we have a budgeted loss of £19K. I hope that I have made our position clear for 2011 and would add that projections for future years look even more bleak.

"So what can we do about it?

"Firstly, we ask that you, our ever faithful members, review your level of giving on an annual basis. If you are able to give a little more, then every penny helps. Please remember that you can instruct your bank to make regular payments via Standing Order.

"Secondly, we ask that all those who pay tax on their income sign a Gift Aid Declaration form. This allows St. Mary's to reclaim 20% of your givings back from the Government. In addition, you can claim tax relief on your givings at your highest rate of tax.

"Now some of you may be wondering why we are sitting on £1 million of assets and yet we are looking to increase our income. Allow me to recap on what I said about our assets. Our £1 million generates £38 K of income. If we sell some of these shares, then we obviously receive the proceeds of the sale to use to pay our expenditure. But if we no longer have the asset, no income is generated in future and the £38K decreases, causing a bigger problem next year.

"So in summary, we are in a difficult situation with losses projected for this year and beyond, losses which can only be covered from our reserves, thus decreasing our capacity to earn income in the future.

"The Treasurer and the Finance Committee closely monitor all aspects of our finances on an ongoing basis and they decided that it was important that you, the congregation, were made aware of the position. I hope that I have explained the situation in such a way that everyone now has a better understanding.

"If anyone has any questions or would like to discuss any aspect of what I have said, I will be in the Huntingdon Aisle after the Service. I also have a supply of forms covering both Standing Orders and Gift Aid Declarations if anyone would like one."

Linking with St Stephens and West

On 9th October the Session Clerk explained to the congregation why there was to be a trial linking of St Mary's and St Stephen's and West Church, Broughty Ferry. Here is what he said.

"From time to time there are in the press gloomy articles lamenting the fact that the number of Church members throughout Scotland continues to fall, and so does the number of ministers. The question is asked: Where is the Church going?

"The General Assembly is aware of this and has instructed every Presbytery to show how the work of the Church could be carried out in its area if it were to have fewer ministers. In Dundee we are expected to lose 7.2 ministers, deacons and parish workers by 2014. This will leave about 28 ministers in post.

"The stage has been reached in Dundee where Presbytery has asked each congregation to submit in writing by the end of this October 2011 a statement describing how it assists the mission of the Church at present and how it intends to do so in the future. It is not the case that if a congregation becomes vacant, it can automatically expect to be allowed to call a minister. Even if a congregation has a minister, it can be asked to consider uniting with a vacant one. Sometimes this request can be difficult to refuse.

"All Churches are vulnerable. The fact that we are the City Church of Dundee and have always been fortunate in being able to meet our commitments by paying large sums of money for the work of the Church (over £60,000 last year) does not make us any less vulnerable than any other.

"We have therefore had to consider very carefully what we should do in order to act in the best interests of St Mary's.

"We looked around and saw that there could be mutual benefit by St Mary's entering into an informal pilot linking arrangement with St Stephen's and West Church in Broughty Ferry .

"We chose this congregation because in many ways it is a congregation not unlike our own. It became vacant when its minister retired. It was then told by Presbytery that it would not be allowed to call a successor. It wishes to preserve its identity and does not wish to enter into a formal union with another congregation.

It is very go-ahead and has active youth organisations. When its spire was damaged by lightning, it paid for the repairs by using the proceeds from the sale of its manse together with money obtained from special fund-raising events.

"I should explain the difference between a linking and a union. If two congregations are linked formally, they share a minister, but retain their identities and function in all other respects in the same way as before. They retain their Kirk Sessions. If two congregations are united, they become one congregation with one Kirk Session and usually meet for worship in one of their buildings. Often, the other building is sold.

"What we are proposing is that for a trial period of one year in the first instance our two congregations be linked informally (**NOT** united). If after one year, the trial linking is successful, we can ask Presbytery to formalise it. If it is not successful, the trial will be terminated. If desired, the trial period can be extended. During the trial period, there are **NO** financial implications.

"The trial linkage has been approved by both Kirk Sessions and is being explained to the congregation of St Stephen's and West this morning. [9th October]

"The Interim Moderator at St Stephen's and West is Rev James Roy. He is wholeheartedly in favour of the linkage and will do all that he can to support it. He gets on well with Mr Hall. He and Mr Hall will work as a team and will exchange pulpits from time to time.

"If and when the linkage is formalised, Mr Hall will become the minister of the linked charge and our manse will be the manse of the linked charge. Both congregations would share the costs of stipend and any repairs required at the manse. We are not at that stage, however, and at the moment there are **no** financial implications.

"I am sure that there are various ways in which we can help St Stephen's and there are various ways in which they can help us. I wondered if we should invite their members to come to our Guild and Wednesday Club. I am sure they would reciprocate.

"We feel that by going ahead with the trial linking we are acting in the best interests of both congregations and we hope you will support us."

Dr Graham's Homes in Kalimpong, India

You will remember that our sponsorship of a young boy from a very poor Indian family, Ryan Neil, at Dr Graham's Homes in Kalimpong came to a rather sudden end after the Kirk Session heard that the child had been withdrawn from school by his parents in the summer of 2010. While we have not lost touch with the school, the Kirk Session has not initiated another sponsorship for the time being.

The recent Newsletter from the UK committee supporting Dr Graham's Homes told of some very ill-timed news: an earthquake in the mountainous area where the school is situated has destroyed or damaged about ten of the school buildings and residential cottage homes where the children live in term time. No child was hurt but this is a major blow for the school authorities and, although the properties are insured, it will cost a lot to reconstruct and replace the damaged buildings.

A Word about the Music

It's Advent, Christmas and Epiphany again so certain pieces crop up year on year. O thou the central orb is one of a number of favourites that is returning once again: however, you may notice a slight change in the text though - "transforming day to souls" has been corrected to "transforming clay to souls" which makes a lot more sense.

All the choral music throughout the Advent/ Christmas season is in English with the exception of *Rorate Coeli* by Josef Rheinberger. A translation of this Advent antiphon would be:

Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just
Let the earth be opened and send forth a Saviour.

The organ music over Advent/Christmas is, as always, related to the season: various settings of chorale melodies by composers such as Bach, Lemmens and the very prolific anon. A number of these works are quite simple in construction: Lemmens' "Creator alme siderum" (Creator of the starry skies), Zachow's "In Dulci Jubilo" (In sweet rejoicing) and anon's "Nun komm der Heiden Heiland" (Now come, saviour of the peoples) are quite simple settings with the melody at the top of the texture. The latter melody seems to have been one of Bach's favourites - 2 cantatas are based on it and a number of organ settings have come down to us. BWV599 is taken from his *Orgelbuchlein* "Little Organ Book".

Also featured over Christmas is the French composer Daquin - 2 Noels from his collection of *Nouveau Livre...* the *Noël Suisse* is one of his best known works and this will be followed by his *Noël Etranger* the following week. And just to keep the theme going, Dubois' take on the *Noël* will precede the service on Christmas Day.

Into the New Year sees chorale preludes still dominating the organ music - Bach again strongly featured but other composers include Karg-Elert (from his mammoth Op65 collection) and also more modern composers such as Dupré.

Fun though chorale preludes are (and it is satisfying to play music appropriate to the season), I've been missing playing larger works so I've decided that from first January, one Sunday a month will feature a Bach Prelude and Fugue. It seems appropriate to start in C major so BWV 531 will be the first one performed in the series. Unfortunately it starts with a pedal solo but at least the date ensures a smaller audience....

One of the suggested readings for 22/1/12 is the story of Jesus changing water into wine at a wedding feast so the RSCM have suggested playing various pieces from Heilscher's *Californian Wine Suite*. With titles like *Cabernet Sauvignon (Fanfare)*, how could an organist resist? Before the service a *Chardonnay (Pavane)* will be served and during the offering we'll take advantage of *Late Harvest (Reverie)*. It's the only organ book that contains a guide to wines that I know of!
